GORDON ROTHWELL BRADSHAW, B.Sc., O.L.S.

Mr. Bradshaw was born on July 2nd, 1899, to Joseph Charles and Mary Elizabeth Bradshaw. His early education was obtained in Nelson, B.C., and he graduated from McGill University with a degree in Civil Engineering.

Apprenticeship was served under the late Alex Matheson of Swastika, Ontario, and he was admitted to practise as an Ontario Land Surveyor on June 27th, 1929.

From 1935 to 1944, Mr. Bradshaw was on the engineering staff of the Teck-Hughes Mine in Kirkland Lake. From 1944 to 1946, he was located at Red Lake, Ontario, where he was engaged in consulting and surveying. In 1946 he moved to Kenora where he continued his survey practice. He retired as an O.L.S., effective May 13th, 1963.

During his long and active career, Mr. Bradshaw was associated with many mining companies, in various capacities, in different parts of the Provinces of British Columbia, Manitoba, Ontario and Quebec.

He was also active in community work, was an Anglican and a member of the Masonic Order. One of his hobbies was contract and duplicate bridge. He belonged to the Kenora Bridge Club and played in a duplicate tournament in Phoenix, Arizona, in 1968. He was particularly fond of his orchids, which he grew with success. This is one of the most demanding of hobbies, and requires great interest and meticulous care to produce blooms. This he did, and furthermore developed a new form, a prize winner, named aptly Cattelaya "Gold Prospector".

Mr. Bradshaw is survived by his wife, the former Mary Elizabeth Winship, one son, Joseph Charles, of Keewatin, Ontario, a daughter, Mrs. Doyle, of St. Louis, Missouri, and a daughter Mrs. Pierce, of Santa Cruz, California.

Mr. Bradshaw suffered a heart attack while visiting Mrs. Pierce in California, and passed away on March 19th, 1969.
