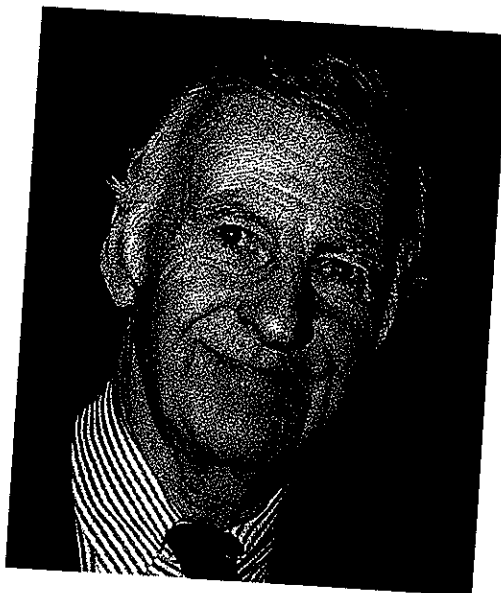
Vic's greatest passion was for the Kiwanis Club. He joined the club over 42 years ago, was the President in 1965 and was awarded a Life Membership in 1991. Even though he was not required to pay club dues, he insisted on doing so to do his share in the running of the club's general affairs. He was a very active and dependable Kiwanian and was willing to work to help in organizing and looking after various projects. He spent many hours working at and setting up schedules to man the Kiwanis Music Festival, driving the adjudicators to various locations and returning them to their hotel in the evening. He was in charge of ordering the Christmas cakes and trees. Vic's greatest love was in helping the physically handicapped children. He was the Chairman of the New Liskeard Kiwanis Easter Seal and Crippled Children Committee for many years up until the time of his passing. In earlier years he would arrange for the Doctors from Sick Children's Hospital to travel from Toronto to Clinics held in New Liskeard. Vic faithfully attended the Camp Northwood Committee meetings and had always been interested in sending physically handicapped children to that camp and seeing that the camp continued to operate each year.

After graduating in 1950, he married Dorothy Dickson and they had two sons William (1958) and Bruce (1962).

ROWLAND WILFRED BROTHERHOOD
Born June 5th 1912 – Died March 20th 2001

The 74th President of the Association of Ontario Land Surveyors (1965) was born in Brandon, Manitoba, the eldest son of Rowland Henderson Brotherhood and Marie Nesta (nee Middleton), on June 5th 1912. He attended public and high schools at Elkhorn, Manitoba and St. John's College, Winnipeg, Manitoba.



Moving east to Toronto in 1929, he attended Oakwood Collegiate and the University of Toronto, graduating in 1934 with a B.A.Sc. in Civil Engineering. As an undergraduate, in 1932, in the employ of E.L. Moore, O.L.S., he had his first surveying experience during the subdivision of the Township of Horden on the Moose River, as chainman.

Upon graduation, in the employ of the Department of Northern Development in 1934, the winter was spent on the location of the Trans-Canada Highway along Lake Superior, followed by construction of same as Assistant Engineer from Steel River to Hemlo, Northern Ontario.

Early in 1937, in the employ of the Property Department of Ontario Hydro he served his apprenticeship with the late Charles Motton, O.L.S. and obtained his commission in January 1940.

Entering the Royal Canadian Navy in 1942, and graduating from King's College, Halifax, he was posted to the Corvette H.M.C.S. Kamloops on Atlantic convoy duty followed by a command course and posting to a minesweeper as Captain. He retired at the end of the European war as Lieutenant-Commander R.C.N.V.R.(R).

In 1946, Wilf went north to join the firm of Sutcliffe Company, Engineers and Surveyors in New Liskeard, Ontario. On the retirement of Homer Sutcliffe, O.L.S, he took over the company as Managing Partner involved in mining claim surveys, townsite layouts (e.g. Manitowadge), pipeline and railway spur surveys, water, sewer and road design, and construction for many northern municipalities.

Over the years, in Northern Ontario, Wilf combined a busy professional life with civic duties as President of New Liskeard Kiwanis Club and as Chairman of the Board of Education, the Children's Aid Society and the Temiskaming District Board of Hospital Planning.

On his retirement from H. Sutcliffe Ltd. in 1974, and fulfilling a life-long ambition, Wilf and his wife, Mary, purchased a sailboat and sailed for a number of years in Georgian Bay, Florida, the Gulf of Mexico and the Bahamas.

He married Mary Caroline Spragge of Cobourg in 1940, raising three sons: Peter (of Cobourg), John (of Whitby), and Timothy (of Barrie). He left New Liskeard in 1979 to reside in Cobourg where he enjoyed curling, golf and gardening, and spending winters in Florida.
