

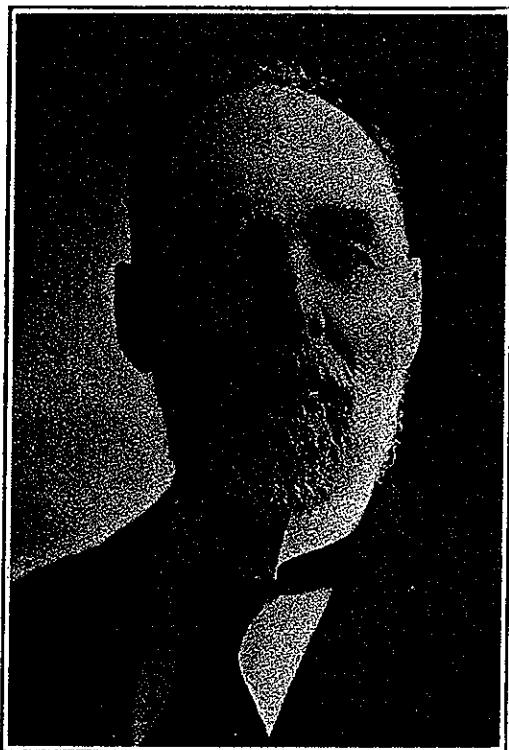
May, Arthur Gordon and Margery Whittaker, but only the third and fifth now survive. In addition to his widow and two children, five grandchildren are now living.

THOMAS BYRNE

By his daughter, Mrs. Mary F. McNamara

Was one of the sons of Edward Byrne and his wife Margaret Stanley, residing in Pittsburg township, near Kingston Mills, five miles from the City of Kingston. Kingston Mills are of historic fame, built for the United Empire Loyalists.



Thomas Byrne was a descendant of grandparents who made a hurried exit from Ireland after the Rebellion in 1798.

He spent his youth on his father's farm in Pittsburg township, Frontenac county, the old homestead having a large stone residence at the junction of the Perth and the Gananoque roads, which is still occupied.

He attended Regiopolis College in Kingston, was articled to Mr. W. H. Deane of Lindsay, and was admitted to practise surveying on the 15th July, 1862.

He practised his profession at Sarnia and Sault Ste. Marie, but the greater part of his field work was done in Northern Ontario and in the

North West Territories, including the survey of the following townships in Muskoka, Parry Sound and Nipissing Districts:

Medera, Wood, Monteith, McMurrich, Harrison, Mills, Blair, Gibson, Mowat, Bonfield, Deonie, Osler, Lister, Freswick, Deacon, Auglin and Dickson.

He was married in 1871 at St. Clair, Michigan, to Elizabeth Ferguson, who was from near Perth county, Ont.

Thomas was born September 1st, 1839, and died on the 13th August, 1903. And his wife Elizabeth was born November 9th, 1844, and died February 4th, 1919, and both were buried in the Roman Catholic Cemetery at Sarnia.

One child, Mary F., was born to them who is now the wife of the late V. McNamara, K.C., of Sault Ste. Marie, Ontario.

JOSEPH MARTIN TIERNAN

Of Tilbury, was born 1855, and died of typhoid fever on December 15th, 1900.

He was articled to Augustus MacDonell for three years, and was appointed a Land Surveyor on the 6th January, 1886.

He married the widow of Joseph Keller of Chatham, whose maiden name was Eva McLaughlin. They had three children:—

1. Eva Maria, born March 4th, 1892. Married Joseph Maloney, and now lives at 408-915 East Harrison St., Seattle, Washington.

2. Joseph Maurice, born November 15th, 1894. Married Eveline McCarthy at the Cathedral in Seattle, on November 1st, 1937, and is said to live now at Olympria, Washington.

3. Margaret Rose, born September 2nd, 1896, is now at White Horse, Yukon, c/o National Airways. She is thought to have been married last fall.

Mrs. Tiernan's son by her first husband is Charles Keller, connected with the Freight Department of the Canadian Pacific Railway at Chatham.

Mr. Tiernan was a Roman Catholic in religion and strict follower of his church. He was of a quiet, retiring disposition, had no Lodge connections, and no particular hobbies.

He carried on his work as a Land Surveyor and Municipal Engineer in and around Tilbury, and did considerable work for Ontario in the Districts of Nipissing, Algoma and Thunder Bay and Rainy River, including the survey of the townships of Dack, Tolten, Porter, Hanmer, Archibald, Tupper, Aubrey,
