Fred F. Miller gave much time and attention to church affairs. For many years he represented St. Mary Magdalene's Church in the Ontario Diocesan Synod and he frequently sat in the Provincial and General Synods. At the time of his death he was a member of the Executive Committee of the Diocese of Ontario, the General Board of Missions and the Council for Social Service of the Church of England in Canada.

L. O. CLARKE

Leonard Oswald Clarke was born at London, Ontario, on July 19th, 1881. His father, John B. Clarke, married Miss Joell, both Canadian born.

His parents had the following children:—

Wm. M., of Sarnia; Charles J., of London; Mrs. R. B. Crosbie, Forest; Mrs. J. W. Bowen, Chicago, and Mrs. J. M. Hickey, who died in May, 1918.

Mr. L. O. Clarke married Miss Helena Bogart on January 1st, 1907. He had three children: Esther, born 1908; Mary, born 1910, and one son, Joell, born July 3rd, 1918.

He served under articles with F. W. Farncomb, of London, and qualified as an Ontario Land Surveyor on February 14th, 1903. For a few months he was employed at Smith's Falls, Ont., then to Sault Ste. Marie, Ont.

In 1904 he went to North Bay, where he was town engineer from 1905 to 1910. He also carried on a general practice in Northern Ontario, and from 1911 to 1914 he was



employed on contract on the Lake Superior division of C.P.R. Mr. Clarke laid out the Townsite of Cobalt. Mr. George P. Angus, O.L.S., of North Bay (1911), served his apprenticeship with Mr. Clarke.

In August, 1915, he removed to Toronto with his family.

He died in North Bay Hospital from influenza on November 22nd, 1918, and was buried at Aurora, where he had purchased a home a month before his death. His widow and children now live in Aurora.

FREDERICK JOHN ANDERSON

Frederick John Anderson was born at Niagara Falls, Canada, on March 14th, 1886. His father was Francis Mackenzie Anderson, of Ross-shire, Scotland, who has spent



the greater part of his life as a merchant at Niagara Falls, and his mother was Clara Anna Trorey, who was born on part of the Government Reserve, now known as Queen Victoria Park, within sight of the Great Horseshoe Falls. Fred Anderson, known to his friends as "Bidly," was educated at the Public Schools and Collegiate Institute at Niagara Falls, and after graduation decided to take up the profession of engineering and surveying. Entering the School of Science, affiliated with Toronto University, he graduated in 1907, and took his post-graduate course the following year, graduating in 1908, with the degree B.A.Sc.

Following his technical training he was employed upon Government work for several summers, and was articled to F. W. Paulin, O.L.S., qualifying as an Ontario Land Surveyor on May 1st, 1910. Under Mr. Paulin he was engaged upon local work at Niagara Falls and sub-division work at Kenora,
