One of his notable contributions to surveying in Ontario was the astronomical determination of two critical points for the eventual survey of the Ontario-Manitoba boundary. This work is described in the report of the Ontario-Manitoba Boundary Commission, 1955.

In 1955, he retired from civil service in the position of Assistant Dominion Geodesist and established himself in practice as an Ontario Land Surveyor in Ottawa until 1960.

He was a member of the United Church of Canada and the Civil Service Lodge A.F. and A.M., Scottish Rite.

Mr. Ney, who passed away on August 5, 1972, is survived by his wife Muriel (nee Walsh), daughters Mrs. J. A. (Barbara Ruth) Calder and Mrs. Helen Virginia Webb, and son Marshall Walsh Ney, all of Ottawa.

In accordance with Mr. Ney's wishes, his ashes were scattered over Ney Harbour in Frobisher Bay.

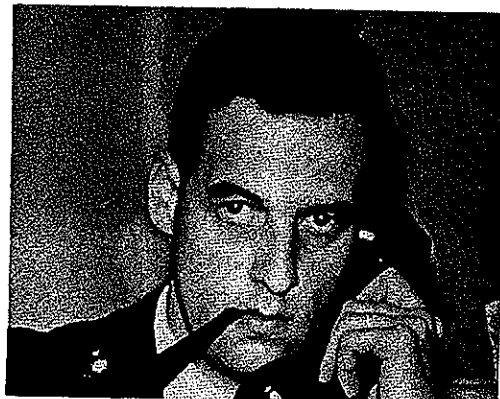
He received his early education at St. Mary's College, Trinidad. In 1949, he transferred to St. Michael's College, Toronto, where he completed his High School.

In 1952, John returned to Trinidad and St. Mary's College, where he taught until his emigration to Canada in 1954. He settled in Toronto and continued his education at Central Technical School.

Subsequently, he was employed by the Survey Department of Ontario Hydro and in 1956, he went to work for Messrs. Yates and McEwen as a Party Chief. Later, he worked for the Borough (then the Township) of North York in the same capacity and in 1959, he received his commission as an Ontario Land Surveyor. That same year he joined the firm of Yates and Yates. The winter of 1965 saw him relinquish this position to take up an appointment with the firm of Marshall Macklin Monaghan Limited, Ontario Land Surveyors in Don Mills. He remained with this firm until his sudden death on September 24, 1972.

John is survived by his wife Yolanda with their two sons and three daughters at home in Willowdale, his mother and two sisters in Trinidad and a sister in Toronto.

It was a singular privilege to have served my articles and to have been associated with John C. Daly. He was well liked and respected by those who knew him and will be greatly missed by them.
