

He was a member of the Knights of Columbus, C.M.B.A., the Separate School Board and also a valued member of the O.L.S. Association, of which he was President in 1915.

The late Mr. FitzGerald spent his whole life in Peterboro where he was well and favorably known by all those with whom he came into intimate contact. Of a retiring disposition, he was slow to make friends, but friendship once made was not easily broken.

The following Editorial appeared in "The Peterboro Examiner" at the time of his demise:

"The death of Mr. James W. FitzGerald, C.E., means to many Peterboro citizens the passing of a most highly esteemed friend, and to the community at large the loss of a solid, dependable citizen whose opinion on civic matters and other public issues was perhaps all the more valuable because it was not promulgated freely.

"In his profession as Land Surveyor, which Mr. FitzGerald had followed here for over forty years, his ability and integrity were always widely recognized.

"As a citizen of Peterboro, while he did not seek civic preferment, Mr. FitzGerald always took a keen interest in municipal affairs and in public movements that had as their motive the betterment of Peterboro.

Death's call has taken away from Peterboro many well-known and useful citizens during the past year, and in their passing they have left their home city the poorer."

JAMES HALL

James Hall was born at Clackmannan, Scotland, on April 14th, 1806, and came to Canada with his parents and their family in 1820. They settled in the Township of Lanark.

His father was James Hall, II, 1768-1833, and his mother, Jean Russell, 1767-1857. His grandfather, also James Hall, I, left the north of England on account of some religious persecution and settled in Scotland at Parkland Farm, near Clackmannan.



On October 27th, 1825, he qualified as a Deputy Land Surveyor in the Province of Upper Canada. When he qualified as a Land Surveyor, he travelled to a place in New York State (probably Troy) to purchase his surveying instruments which he brought back with him. He practiced at first at Lanark, but shortly afterwards he removed to Halifax, N.S., where he continued his professional work until 1835, when he came to

Peterboro. He entered into mercantile and manufacturing pursuits and did little surveying at Peterboro.
