

## T. W. HERRICK

Thomas Wallis Herrick was the second son Herrick, of Bellmount, County of Cork, Ireland, and was born in 1828.

He was educated at Trinity College, Dublin, taking the degree of A. B.

He came to Canada after reaching manhood, served under articles as a Land Surveyor and passed his final examination on January 12th, 1856.

In 1854 he had charge of Grand Trunk Railway survey, from St. Mary's to London, when Mr. J. H. Esten was a member of Mr. Herrick's survey party.

Mr. Herrick acted as assistant to Mr. A. P. Salter on exploration work on the north shore of Lake Huron in 1857. It would appear that he also made a survey in this year independently for the Government, commencing at post planted by Salter in Latitude  $46^{\circ} 32' 27''$  on the principal meridian and 12 miles north of Salter's base line.

In 1859, he surveyed the Townships of Neebing, and Paipoonge at Thunder Bay, also made the Town Plot of Fort William. In 1859 he was also engaged in surveying mining locations in the Thunder Bay District.

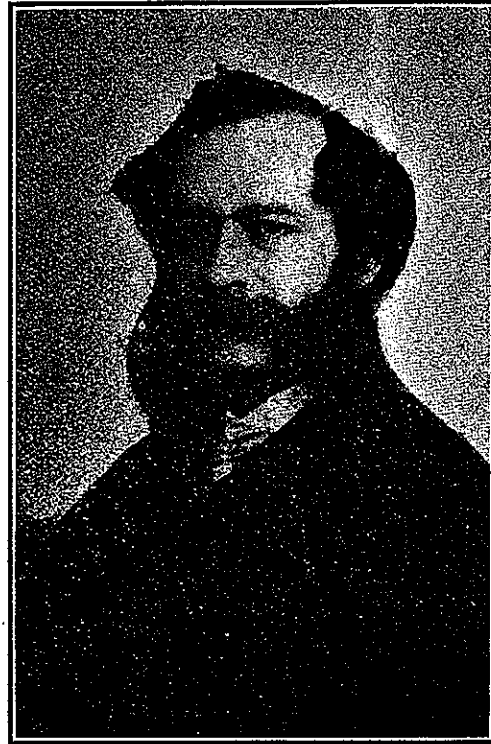
In 1860 he ran an exploration survey line north of Lake Superior, approximately parallel with the shore line commencing at Salter's base line at Sault Ste. Marie and terminating at the Kaministiquia River.

In 1861 he was engaged on surveys north of Michipicoten River.

John Lindsay 1857, W. H. E. Napier 1857, E. R. Usher 1860, and James M. Irwin 1863 were articulated to Mr. Herrick.

Mr. Herrick was a nephew of the very well known Doctor Herrick, of Toronto.

He was unmarried. He died in Toronto on January 29th, 1872, and was buried in St. James' Cemetery.
