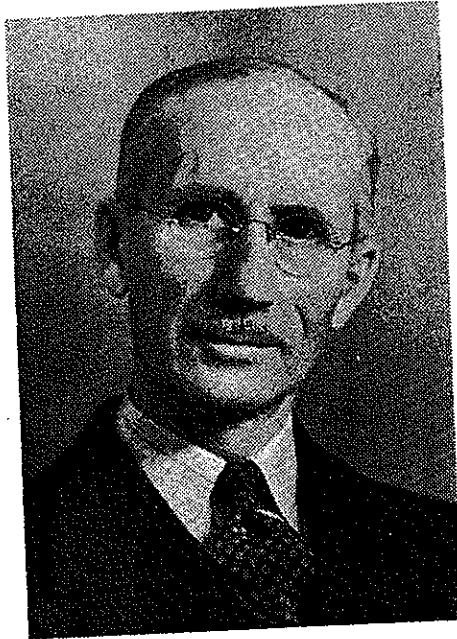

FREDERICK CARLTON LANE, O.L.S., P.Eng.  
1884 - 1965

Frederick Carleton Lane was born at Mosley near London, Ontario, on October 14, 1884, the youngest of nine children.

In 1891 the family moved from the farm at Mosley to new farming land southwest of Regina. He returned to St. Catharines for his high school education, spending his Saturdays working for a surveyor there.

He went west again to work on a ranch for a few years before entering Queen's University in 1907. After completing the first year in engineering he came north for the summer to work for the Canadian Copper Company at Copper Cliff, Ontario. His health did not permit him to stay at this work and he came into Sudbury in the fall of 1908 to article in land surveying with R. W. DeMorest, O.L.S. He completed his articles under T. D. Green, O.L.S., in 1911.

He was commissioned an Ontario Land Surveyor on February 22, 1912, and went into practice on his own account in Sudbury shortly thereafter.

In 1918 he was appointed Town Engineer for the Town of Sudbury. In 1929 he went back into private practice as a land surveyor and professional engineer. In 1946 he was joined in partnership by his

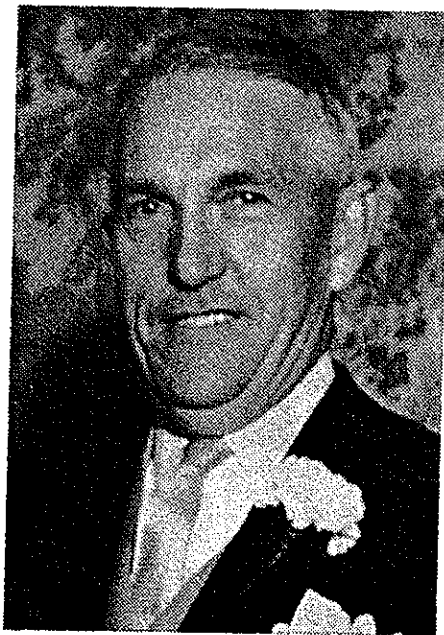

son Lenox and in 1952 by his son Raymond. He continued to participate in the partnership until 1955 after which time he served in an advisory capacity.

He married Doris Thompson in 1912, who survives him together with three sons, Gordon, Lenox and Ray, all of Sudbury, and 11 grandchildren. Two sons, Carleton and William, predeceased him, being killed in service in the R.A.F. and the R.C.A.F. during World War II.

His interest in his family, his community, in outdoor life and the welfare of young people was strong. He served as a member of the Council of the Association for two years. He was a member of the Association of Professional Engineers, served on the Sudbury Public School Board and the Sudbury High School Board. He served as President of the Sudbury and District Association of Boy Scouts. He was an honorary member of the Canadian Legion Branch 76 and a member of the Church of the Epiphany (Anglican) in Sudbury.

He passed away at the Sudbury Memorial Hospital on February 21, 1965. Burial took place in the Anglican Cemetery in Sudbury.



JOHN ROCHE ORENDORFF, B.Sc., O.L.S.

1912 - 1965

Born in London, Ontario, on August 28, 1912, John Roche Orendorff was the second child in the family of Austin Ambrose Orendorff and Clara Celestine Roche.

The Orendorffs were a pioneer family which came from the Palatinate, settling in what is now New York State, in the late sixteen hundreds. By 1734 the family had moved inland to establish a settlement on the Mohawk and by 1767 had moved again to establish a settlement
