

JOHN LINDSAY

John Lindsay the son of William Burns Lindsay, Sr., was born in Quebec City in 1883. He was articled for three years (May 11th, 1855 to May 11th, 1858) to J. Stoughton Dennis at that time residing in Weston and was sworn in as a P.L.S. for Upper Canada on 11th of July, 1857.

He resided in Toronto for the next three years and was employed by the Crown Lands Department in the survey of Township Boundaries in Haliburton in 1857, on Pensioners' lots and the reform prison farm at Penetanguishene in 1858 and on the survey of the boundaries of the Town of Keswick in North Gwillimbury Township and on an angular survey on the Severn River in 1859.

He resided at various times in Quebec and Kingston and was also a P.L.S. for Lower Canada. He worked on the Intercolonial boundary survey in Quebec and also upon colonization lands north of Lake Superior. He was afterwards Divisional Engineer on construction work of the Intercolonial Railway and subsequently on the Canadian Pacific Railway at Mattawa where he died on September 28th, 1880.

He was buried in Mount Hermon Cemetery, Quebec. He was a member of the Church of England.
