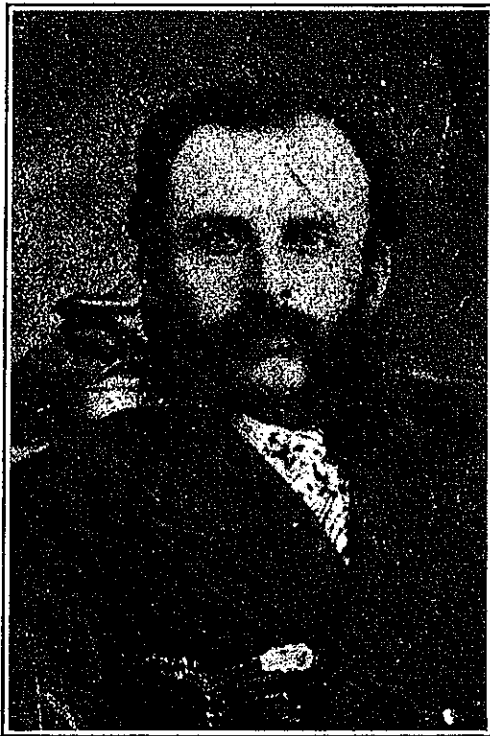


JOHN HENRY OGILVIE

His parents, William Ogilvie and Martha Haney, came to Canada in the year 1835 from their place of birth in Larne, in the North of Ireland, where his paternal grandparents were born.



For the first few years after reaching Canada his father resided in Bytown (Ottawa), and then moved to the township of Seymour, in the county of Northumberland, Ontario, and erected the first house in the present town of Campbellford.

His parents were born in April, 1818, and died within a week of one another in February, 1877. His paternal grandfather died in 1859, and his paternal grandmother, Agnes Breiden, lived to the age of ninety-four, and died in 1885 or 1886.

His father's brothers and sisters were: James, the father of William Ogilvie, the distinguished O.L.S. and

D.L.S. and one time Commissioner of the Yukon, and explorer; John, Samuel, David and Robert, and two sisters, Matilda and Bella.

His brothers and sisters were: William, Robert Clinton, Mrs. J. O. Dowsley, Mrs. Henry Stanbury, Mrs. W. J. Vrooman, and Colonel G. Hunter Ogilvie, the Sergeant-at-Arms, Parliament Buildings, Toronto, who so kindly provided the data for this biography.

He served his apprenticeship with Major Webb, of Brighton, Ont., and qualified as a Land Surveyor on the eighth of April, 1876. His brother, G. Hunter Ogilvie, served an

apprenticeship with him, the latter part of which was interrupted by the North West Rebellion in 1885.

He made his home in Campbellford, Ont., where he practiced surveying, and carried on mining.

He was a bachelor, and died in the summer of 1898, in Superior, Wisconsin, and his remains were conveyed home to Campbellford for interment.
