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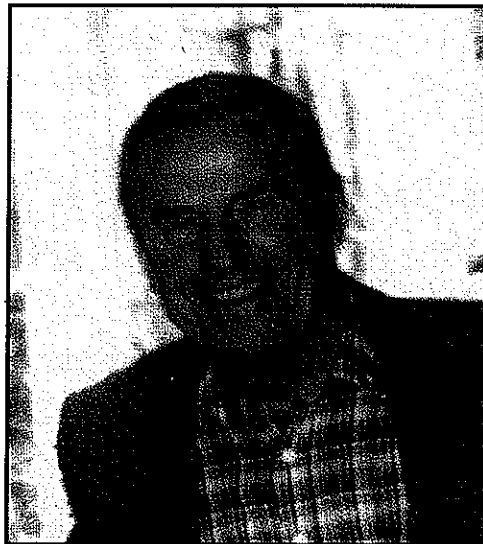
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H.F. "TY" PALLECK
1911 - 1988

Ty was born in Thunder Bay, then Fort William, where his father owned a Hardware Store, and it was his after school and summer job to help out. Ty attended St. Stanislaus School and Fort William Collegiate, where he obtained his Senior Matric. His first job after High School was with the Alexander Power Development of Ontario. When the project was completed he worked as a rodman and instrumentman for Northern Development on Highways construction and location until 1936.

Ty was then prospecting and working for Magnet Lake Mining, core-splitting, drafting and blueprinting.

In 1937, Ty was employed by Civil Aviation (Dept. of Transport) as instrumentman under G.R. Hill, District Airways Engineer at Sioux Lookout. In 1940, he was made Resident Engineer under E.F. Cooke, Winnipeg, and worked on location and construction of airports for the British Commonwealth Air Training Plan. In January of 1943, Ty joined the RCAF and trained and was commissioned as Aircrew Navigator and served overseas with the RCAF Bomber Command. He returned to Canada and was discharged in September 1945.

In 1946, Ty started with the Department of Highways, articulated under Harold Howden, and was in the program surveying the Provincial Highways of Ontario.

In 1952, Ty joined the Ontario Hydro in London as District Surveyor and was transferred to Kenora, Port Arthur and Ottawa, and finally back to London, where he retired in 1976.

While in Ottawa in 1967, Ty along with fellow Ottawa Surveyors, as their Centennial Project, surveyed the Capital Hill and Parliament Grounds, as it had never been done.

Ty was married in Winnipeg in 1944 to Mona Caton. They have two sons Brian (Ottawa) and Stephen (Deep River) and two daughters Norah (Spain) and Sharon (Hamilton). There are 15 grandchildren.

Ty was a sports enthusiast and loved to curl and golf. He spent time travelling to Europe, Arizona and the West Coast. The last several years of his life, he spent three months in Florida, where he died in Fort Lauderdale. He was buried in St. Peter's Cemetery from St. Pius X Church, in London where he was active in the St. Vincent de Paul.
