

### GUY L. RAMSEY

When curling at the rink at his home town, Sault Ste. Marie, Thursday, January 8th, 1925, Mr. G. L. Ramsey fell on the ice, causing concussion of the brain, from which he died on Friday, January 9th, without regaining consciousness. His tragic death was a great shock to the community.



Guy L. Ramsey was born at Dunnville, Ont., January 31st, 1883. His paternal grand parents came from the north of Ireland to the County of Haldimand, Ont. One of his great grand parents was Colonel Cotter, who served with Wellington at Waterloo.

His father, Francis J. Ramsey, and his mother, Mary Maude Johnson, were natives of Dunnville, where Guy L. Ramsey was born on January 31st, 1883. His mother died on May 18th, 1918, and his father died on December 10th, 1920.

He attended the public and high school at Dunnville, and graduated from the School of Practical Science in 1905. When at college he took a prominent part in sports, and was manager of Varsity junior hockey team, and in his final year was manager of the Varsity senior team, when the University won its first championship.

He qualified as an Ontario Land Surveyor on February 13th, 1913, having served under articles with Lang and Ross, of Sault Ste. Marie. He remained with this firm until 1919, when he decided to open an independent office at Sault Ste. Marie. He was in general practice then until his death. His last work was in connection with certain new iron discoveries along the Algoma Central Railway.

For the Ontario Government he made the following surveys:—

1919—Base and meridian line District of Thunder Bay.

1919—Traverse Long Lake, District of Thunder Bay.

1924—Village plot, Port MacDiarmid.

He was a member of the University Club of Toronto, the Eng. Inst. of Canada and of the Association of Professional Engineers. Clubs, St. Mary's Club, Sault Ste. Marie County Club, Sault Ste. Marie Boat Club.

On May 16th, 1922, he married Grace Donaldson Johnstone, of London, England.

He is survived by his widow, two sisters: Pearl, wife of John A. Fraser, Toronto; Madeline, wife of Rowan Beaton of Toronto, and one brother, F. R. Ramsey, of Guelph. Another brother, Harry, died in 1902. His funeral was from St. Paul's Church, Dunnville, on January 12th.
