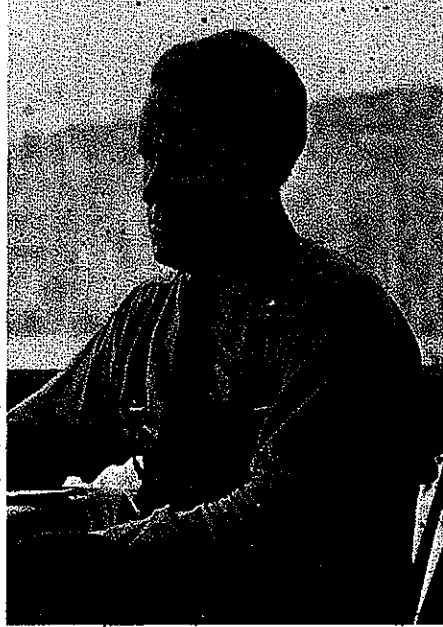


## REPORTS

### CARL REINHARDT O.L.S., D.L.S., B.Sc., M.E.

Carl Reinhardt was born in Montreal, Quebec, on July 9th, 1876, to Charles G. Reinhardt and Anna D. Reim.

Mr. Reinhardt graduated from McGill University in Civil Engineering in 1895 and in Mining Engineering in 1897. He was apprenticed to A. E. Morris, O. L. S., at Perth and granted his certificate as an Ontario Land Surveyor on February 25th, 1899. He was employed on the construction of the Canadian National Railway in the Port Arthur and Rainy River Districts. He went to Colbalt in 1904 where he worked in various capacities as an Ontario Land Surveyor, Consulting Engineer and Mine Manager for some of the major Mining Companies including the Crown Reserve Mining Corporation, Kerr Lake, La rose and Cross Lake Silver Mining Company.



Despite the recession in the Colbalt area following the drop in the price of silver, Mr. Reinhardt maintained faith in the area and progressively selected and acquired various properties. He continued exploration on the properties, and in 1950 a rich silver ore body was developed on his Cross Lake claims which he had staked in 1907.

Mr. Reinhardt was a keen student of precise surveying techniques and geology both locally and in the world at large. He inherited a profound interest in Astronomy from his mother, and he propounded a basic thesis of the Origin of Ores in the Earth's Crust which unfortunately has not been completed due to his desire for perfection and complete proof. He was a member of the Prospectors' and Developers' Association, and an active member of the Royal Astronomical Society of Canada.

Mr. Reinhardt bequeathed many grants to charitable organizations and provided for the disbursement of any profits from his mining properties to be divided among four major Canadian Universities. He also provided a major sum toward the construction of a Planetarium for Ontario.

Mr. Reinhardt had two brothers, Arthur and Rudolph, and two sisters, Mrs. Daisy R. Harvey and Mrs. Doris R. Harkness.

Mr. Reinhardt died at Toronto, July 23rd, 1962, and interment was at Perth, Ontario.
