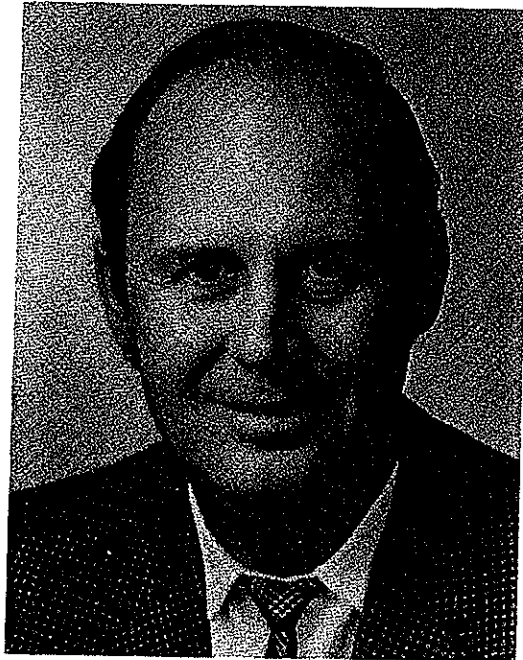


REPORT OF THE BIOGRAPHY COMMITTEE

Donald Campbell Smith was born in St. Catharines, Ontario June 23rd, 1926 to Campbell Taylor Smith, O.L.S., and Verna L. (Hetherington) Smith.

He received his elementary school training in St. Catharines and Oshawa and when the family moved to Kingston in the early 1940's he completed his Secondary School education at K.C.V.I. in Kingston and went on to attend Queen's University and graduated in 1948 with a B.Sc. in Civil Engineering.

For a short time after his graduation from Queen's he worked as an instructor at the Royal Military College in Kingston before articling with his father the late Campbell T. Smith, O.L.S. After receiving his commission as an Ontario Land Surveyor on April 29, 1949 he entered private practise as an Ontario Land Surveyor and Consulting Engineer in partnership with his father in the firm known as Smith & Smith Engineers and Surveyors.

In 1956 the firm of Campbell Smith Limited was incorporated with Donald and Campbell Smith as principal shareholders, to carry out the Engineering practise which they had formerly handled on a partnership basis. The firm of Smith & Smith Surveyors carried on as Partnership in the practise of Professional Land Surveying in Kingston and surrounding areas.

Donald Smith succeeded his father in the position of Consulting Engineer to the Township of Kingston in the early 1960's and remained in that capacity until the time of his passing. As the Township's Consulting Engineer he was the prime force behind the establishment of the Kingston Township Industrial Park which today, due mainly to his efforts, encompasses over two hundred acres filled with industries and service facilities which provide jobs for the people of the area and tax revenue for the municipality. He also played a very major part in the establishment of the Northern Electric Plant in Kingston Township in the late 1960's.

Mr. Smith was a member of the Cataraqui Golf and Country Club and the Kingston Yacht Club and spent his leisure time either boating or golfing and sometimes even managed a relaxing week at the family cottage on an Island in Georgian Bay.

He was president of Bayhill Development Limited a land development company operating mainly in the Kingston area and he was one of the principal officers of Smith & Smith Kingston Limited, a professional land surveying firm.

The Township of Kingston, in recognition of his long and dedicated service as Consulting Engineer, posthumously awarded Donald Smith its Citizen of the Year Award for 1973. The plaque of appreciation was presented to his widow Phoebe Smith in early 1974.

Don is survived by his wife, the former Phoebe T. Heffernan whom he married in Kingston, Ontario in 1950, a daughter Diane, a daughter Kimberley and a son Mark, as well as his mother Mrs. C. T. Smith and a brother Hubert, all of Kingston.

THOMAS EVANS MILWAY O.L.S.
1927 - 1974

Thomas Evans Milway was born in Rouyn, Quebec, July 25, 1927, and educated at Loyola College in Montreal, University of Toronto, and was a graduate of St. Michael's College.

In 1948 he joined the Surveys Branch of the Department of Highways and worked on projects in both northern and southern parts of the Province. He received his commission as an Ontario Land Surveyor in April 1951 after completing his term of articles with Harold S. Howden. In May 1951, in conjunction with George L. Marshall he moved to Sarnia and they established the private practice known as Marshall, Milway. Subsequently, W. A. S. Marshall and Thomas W. Connolly joined the firm. Since 1963 Tom has operated a practice under the firm name Thomas E. Milway, Ontario Land Surveyors, and was engaged in subdivision, planning and aerial photography, and was president of St. Clair Blueprinting Ltd., in Sarnia.

After establishing a practice in Sarnia, Tom became immersed in the affairs of the area. For many years he led the choir at St. Peter's Church, and was president of the Parish Council, a School Trustee, Committee Member of the Planning Board and Committee of Adjustments.
