Major Lawson passed away on July 4, 1968, at the age of 79. Funeral services were held in the Cathedral Church of St. George, followed by cremation at Toronto. Surviving are his daughter, Audrey; his son-in-law, George Holloway; and two grandchildren, George L. Holloway and Ann Holloway.
