JOSEPH MARTIN TIERNAN

Of Tilbury, was born 1855, and died of typhoid fever on December 15th, 1900.

He was articled to Augustus MacDonell for three years, and was appointed a Land Surveyor on the 6th January, 1886.

He married the widow of Joseph Keller of Chatham, whose maiden name was Eva McLaughlin. They had three children:—

1. Eva Maria, born March 4th, 1892. Married Joseph Maloney, and now lives at 408-915 East Harrison St., Seattle, Washington.

2. Joseph Maurice, born November 15th, 1894. Married Eveline McCarthy at the Cathedral in Seattle, on November 1st, 1937, and is said to live now at Olympia, Washington.

3. Margaret Rose, born September 2nd, 1896, is now at White Horse, Yukon, c/o National Airways. She is thought to have been married last fall.

Mrs. Tiernan's son by her first husband is Charles Keller, connected with the Freight Department of the Canadian Pacific Railway at Chatham.

Mr. Tiernan was a Roman Catholic in religion and strict follower of his church. He was of a quiet, retiring disposition, had no Lodge connections, and no particular hobbies.

He carried on his work as a Land Surveyor and Municipal Engineer in and around Tilbury, and did considerable work for Ontario in the Districts of Nipissing, Algoma and Thunder Bay and Rainy River, including the survey of the townships of Dack, Tolten, Porter, Hanmer, Archibald, Tupper, Aubrey,

Southworth, Melgund and Mutrie. He was also given charge of Party No. 6 of the Exploration Surveys in 1900.

He was very averse to having pictures of himself taken, so one of him cannot yet be found, but when it is found will be published.

FRANKLIN JOSEPH ROBINSON

Was the youngest child of Jabel Robinson, ex-M.P. and Caroline Barnwell, his wife, who were married in 1854 at Kingston on the Thames, Surrey, England, in the Parish Church.

He was born October 20th, 1870, in St. Thomas, Canada, and died in the Queens Hotel, Toronto, May 26th, 1917, and buried in the family plot in St. Thomas cemetery, where a tombstone marks his grave.



He was articled to T. R. Deacon at Rat Portage on 11th January, 1897, for one year, articles were transferred to Walter Beatty, 1st July, 1897. He was admitted to practise 21st July, 1898.

His brothers and sisters were, Harriet (Hattie) Robinson, born on the Thames, Surrey, England, in 1855, now deceased. She lived on the Linslade farm, being lot No. 29, Talbot Street, Southwold. She taught school for forty years in St. Thomas, and the county of Elgin; William C. Robinson, born

3rd Sept., 1857, known in the Canadian West as "Stickine Bill." He was a railway contractor, married and lived in North Anson, Maine, and was born in Yarmouth township, near St. Thomas and died there Sept. 8th, 1926; Charles P. Robinson, Veterinary Surgeon, Dean of the Veterinary College, Washington, D.C., born in St. Thomas, 26th July, 1857,
